High Court judge Jeremy Sullivan handed a stinging rebuke to Blair's government, saying the public consultation it carried out before deciding if Britain needed new nuclear power stations was "inadequate" and "wrong", was "seriously flawed" and "procedurally unfair". 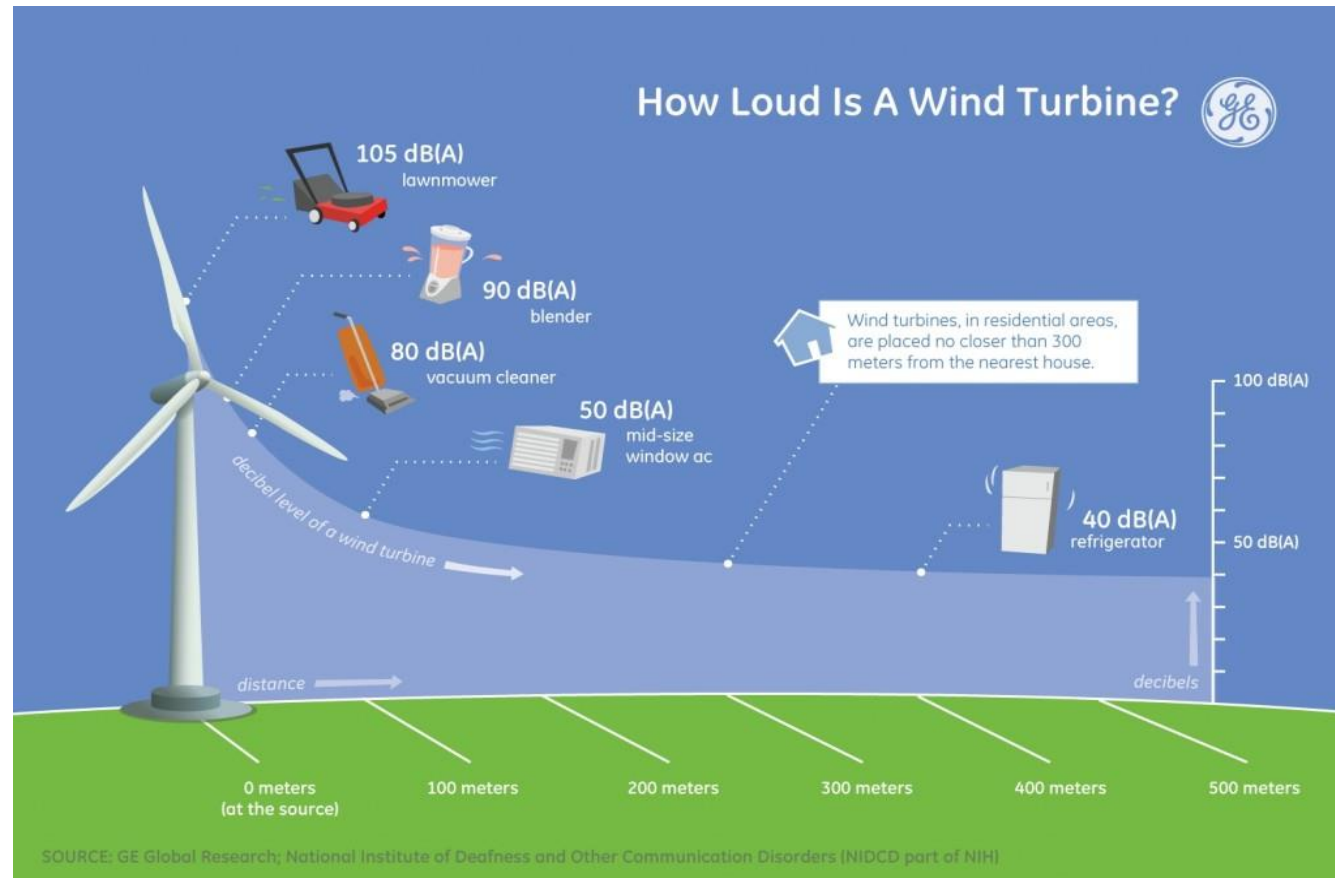
